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The artwork in this calendar is inspired by the delightful book, Sri Sri Radha-Krishna-ganoddesha-dipika, by Srila Rupa Goswami (1489-1564), wherein he describes the eternal associates of Radha and Krishna—Their relatives, friends, servants, and pets. In the pages of this calendar, I have indicated the Sanskrit name of each pet, as given by Rupa Goswami, and its English translation.

ere's your very own calendar! A calendar is like a map of the year. People use a calendar to keep track of time. For each month you will see a grid of 35 squares. Each square represents a day. In your calendar, you can write the number of each day in its square, and you can write in things to remember—holidays, birthdays, and other special occasions. And if you turn to the last pages in this book, you will find some things to do with your calendar—stickers for the Vaishnava holidays, stickers to color for the pets, and a fun matching game.

You can start using your calendar right away, and you can use it in any year. All you have to do is write in the number for each day. Turn to this month and write the numbers where they belong. For example, if it is June and the first day of June is on a Monday, put a 1 in the square of the first Monday. Then continue with a 2 in Tuesday's square, a 3 in Wednesday's square, and so on until you have come to the end of the month. A rhyme that will help you remember the number of days for each month is

30 days has September,

April, June, and November.

All the rest have 31.

A year has 365 days. Those days are divided into 12 months. A month has around 4 weeks and a week has 7 days. Do you know what the 7 days of the week are?

Sunday, Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, Friday, and Saturday.

Do you know what the names of the 12 months are?

January, February, March, April, May, June, July, August, September, October, November, and December.

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
Tungi (proud) is Radha's chubby pet calf.

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
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Radha's pet swan Tundikeri (playing with the beak) is fond of swimming in Radha-kunda.

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

common we have cut six details. Cut out each detail. Find the picture and month the detail comes from, then paste it onto any day you choose. You will have to look closely at each picture. Have fun!






We have created Arts of Vaisnava Culture to give Srila Prabhupada's teachings to children, youth, and people in general through art, literature, drama, and music.
