

Introduction

Many of you may have a pet in your home such as a cat, dog or turtle. Animals often play an important part in our lives either as pets, or as guards, such as trained watchdogs, or as “workers” on farms and ranches, such as bulls and horses.

But, did you know that the Vedas tell many stories about animals that we can learn from? Many of you may already be familiar with some of them. Hanuman, a monkey warrior, is famous for his heroic service to Lord Rama and Jatayu, the vulture-servant of the Lord, gave up his life trying to defend Sita from the evil Ravana, King of Lanka.

In this session we will read about these stories and some others you may not be familiar with. Each personality we will read about exemplifies a quality we should strive for as devotees, such as determination, compassion and loyalty. Each personality was involved in a pastime of the Lord in order to teach us something.

Now, let us begin the session called, “Animals in the Vedas.”


Lesson One

“Foolish sparrow,” the dolphin said, laughing. “You can never move enough water to find your eggs.”


Soon other fish in the water came. The animals on land also heard about what Mother Sparrow was doing.

However, the people continued to throw stones and hurt him. After a while, the snake again desired to meet with his spiritual master.




“My Dear Gurudeva,” the snake said to Narada Muni.



"I am glad You came, Nimai. I am going down to the Ganges to take a bath. Stay here and I will be right back."



Nimai did as His mother said and took the puppy outside. He tied him up at the bottom of the steps.




“Mother, I am going down to the river to take a bath,”




A Bridge for Lord Rama

Introduction:

In Lesson 4 we read about some of the pastimes of Lord Ramacandra and how His friend and servant, Jatayu, gave up his life trying to save Sita. In this lesson we will read about a squirrel-devotee who also served Lord Rama. This story takes place after Jatayu lost the fight with the ten-headed demon, Ravana.



In order to rescue Sita from the evil Ravana, Rama had to cross the ocean to the city of Lanka. Lord Rama called for the monkey, Nila, to build a bridge for Him. Millions of monkeys came to help. 



Lesson 6

Gajendra, The King of the Elephants




