Our Ramayan, set in a post-apocalyptic future of 3392 A.D. is a collective effort. We've tapped the wisdom of great creators like Deepak Chopra and Shekhar Kapur. We've relied on the creativity, research, and endless hours of hardwork of our creative team including lead artists Abhishek Singh and Ashwin Chikerur, writer Shamik Dasgupta and the man who inspires and leads them all in India – our President, Suresh Seetharaman. But more than anything, we've trusted that original epic in all its eternal majesty will provide the pulse that keeps our collective creativity going. So far, so good.

I'm not going to gush about our own work because that would be lame. But I encourage you to take a chance on Ramayan 3392 A.D., read an issue, survey the art and send us your thoughts.
