INTRODUCTION

A perennial problem in the gurukula academic program has been a shortage of Krishna conscious reading material for students to use up until the time when they can regularly handle Srila Prabhupada's books.

When Bhurijana Prabhu was teaching in Gita-nagari, he started a program of "publishing" the children's writings by binding them up into little books. He found that the students enjoyed reading each other's stories. He continued the program when he moved to Vrindaban and Chaya d.d. carried it on in Gita-nagari.

At one of our many meetings where the subject of the shortage of reading material came up, Bhurijana suggested we might collect the little books together and somehow make them available more widely. This Stories by Students series is an attempt to do just that.

I've taken the stories from Vrindaban and Gita-nagari and edited and adapted them into suitable and consistent reading matter for children seven years old and above. This book is the first in a series of similar collections, which will be divided into three distinct levels, this volume being part of level one.

The books are not designed to be a basal reading series, but rather a versatile supplementary tool, from which teach ers may use whatever portions suit them. Several steps have been taken to make this book useful for the classroom as well as general reading for ages 7-9:

- -- The stories were computer analysed for readability level (ease of reading), by word, sentence and paragraph length and construction. Almost all the stories in this volume should be no more difficult than the prose at the end of Let's Read or volume 2:1B of the old Caitanya Readers.
- -- The vocabulary was sorted by grade, and in the present volume, any words which could not reasonably be expected to have been introduced in a basal reading series by the end of Grade Two, have been included in the "New Words" lists.
- -- The content questions at the end of each story are simple comprehension questions and they do not require any difficult reasoning or extrapolation.

I hope that the authors of the stories are not dissatisfied with the way I have edited them for this book. I should point out that most of the stories were written 2-4 years back, so the authors have all grown older and perhaps some of them have new names from their initiations which I am not aware of.

It was so nice to clean for Krishna, because I knew that I cleaned my heart.



Comment

Once, Durvasa Muni went to Maharaja Ambarish's palace while the king was fasting. Before eating, he went to bathe in the Yamuna River. While he was bathing, it was time for Ambarish Maharaja to break his fast. But instead of eating, he only drank some water to break the fast.

When Durvasa Muni returned, he could understand what had happened. He was very, very, very, angry because Maharaja Ambarish drank water without his permission.

Once, when Srila Prabhupada went into the room where Govinda dasi and Gaurasundara dasa worked, he saw tissues all over the floor. He said, "This is why you are always sick, because you are not clean."

Comment


