


The story of Rama and Sita is a part of India. It was first set down by the sage Valmiki in his epic poem in Sanskrit, 'Ramayana'.

Rama was the eldest son of Dasharatha, the King of Ayodhya. The King had three wives-Kaushalya, Kaikeyi and Sumitra. Rama was the son of Kaushalya. Bharata, of Kaikevi and Laxmana and Shatrughuna of Sumitra. As they grew up so did their fame as valiant and brave princes. Sage Vishwamitra came seeking the help of Rama and Laxmana in killing the demoness Tataka. On the way back in the land of King Janaka, Rama succeeded in winning the hand of Sita, the King's daughter, Dasharatha decided that this was the time to crown Rama King. Jealous Kaikeyi persuaded an unwilling Dasharatha to banish Rama into the forest and to crown Bharata the King. Sita and Laxmana opted to follow Rama. While in the forest the Rakshasi Shoorpanakha accosted Rama and eventually had herself disfigured by Laxmana. The angry female went and complained to her brother, Ravana, the King of Lanka. Ravana with a cunning typical of him carried Sita away. Rama and Laxmana in the course of their search for Sita came across the monkey king, Sugreeva and struck a bond of friendship with him. One of Sugreeva's assistants, Hanuman discovered Sita's whereabouts and Rama led the army of monkeys against Lanka, in the terrible battle that ensued Ravana and his associates were killed. Accompanied by Laxmana, Rama and Sita returned to Ayodhya where they were welcomed by Bharata and crowned King and Queen. But their troubles had not ended. How the suspicion of his subjects forced Rama to banish Sita even though she was pregnant and how his sons Luv and Kusha brought up in the ashram of Sage Valmiki were ultimately united with him is told in colourful pictures in the following pages.


